Waste not want not: Food projects in the UK

- [1] Do you ever throw away food at home? Have you ever thought about what happens to the food that shops and supermarkets don't sell? Well, you might be shocked to find out that approximately one third of food produced for human consumption gets wasted. What's more, around 800 million people in the world do not have enough food to lead a healthy life.
- [2] Many people in the UK and across the world are trying to do something about this imbalance and make use of thrown-out food that is perfectly edible. For example, there is a café in Leeds (UK) whose meals are all created using unsold food from supermarkets, including a lot of vegetables, fruit, fish and other items. This unwanted food is turned into delicious soups, casseroles, sauces and curries that feed the hungry people of Leeds. Customers simply pay what they can afford, or help with the washing up. In just ten months, 10,000 people were fed at this café, using twenty tonnes of unwanted food!
- [3] Also, last year, the UK's first food waste supermarket opened. The supermarket is near Leeds and works on a 'pay as you feel' basis; customers pay whatever they want for the produce. The stock changes daily but you can usually find things such as pasta, fresh vegetables, sauces, fruit and milk there. Some low-income families have said that <u>it</u> has changed their lives.
- [4] 'Fuel for School' is another food waste project. Surplus food from supermarkets such as dairy, vegetables, fruit and bread is used to feed hungry schoolchildren whose families may not be able to afford to buy them lunch or snacks.
- [5] I have always been very conscious of the amount of food we waste, and I very rarely throw food away. I have lived in Leeds for three years, and have had lunch at a food waste café. The food was delicious. I couldn't believe that it was all the food that supermarkets had thrown away! I have also participated in projects such as 'Foodcycle', using supermarkets' unwanted food to cook meals for refugees and asylum seekers.
- [6] More cafés like this are being opened in other parts of the UK such as Bristol and Manchester, and it is now becoming a worldwide phenomenon. I think this is an amazing initiative as food waste is one of the world's biggest problems. I also believe that the law should be changed, so that supermarkets won't throw away so much perfectly good food!

Elon Musk: Innovator and Tech Guru

[1] The 21st century is all about innovation. Technology is progressing at an unprecedented rate and the way we live is changing along with it. When historians look back on the early 21st century, they will identify a handful of people who embraced technology. Elon Musk will undoubtedly be one of these people.



- [2] Many people are surprised to learn that Elon Musk was born and raised in Pretoria,

 South Africa. He had a difficult childhood, with his parents separating when he was nine
 years old. As an adult, Elon does not communicate with his father. He moved to Canada
 when he was 17 and then to the United States of America. Currently, he sits quite high on a
 number of global rankings. His net worth, currently around 93 billion dollars, makes him
 the world's 5th richest person. Forbes rated him the most innovative leader of 2019. And his
 time as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Tesla makes him the longest standing CEO of an
 automotive company.
 - [3] Tesla is perhaps what most people know Elon Musk for. It's interesting that one of his greatest achievements involves a company named after someone as eccentric and brilliant as him. Tesla, Inc. was founded in 2003 and named after Nikola Tesla, the Serbian inventor and scientist who contributed more than anyone else to the development of electrical technology. Like Musk, Tesla was no ordinary man. It's fitting that his name should be attached to a company that makes electric cars. Tesla, Inc. is rapidly changing how we think about transport and energy use. Who knows by the time you are old enough to learn to drive, it may well be in an electrical vehicle!
- [4] But Musk's most interesting project, depending on your point of view is space exploration. In 2002, he founded Space Exploration Technologies Corporation (SpaceX) to pursue the vision of making space travel cheaper and perhaps even colonising Mars. In May 2020, SpaceX sent a manned craft into orbit and docked it at the

- International Space Station (ISS). Whether or not humans end up farming on Mars, Elon Musk has revived an entire generation's enthusiasm for space travel. Great things tend to happen when people have their eyes focused upward. Who knows what the future might bring?
 - [5] Much like Nikola Tesla, Elon Musk thinks a little differently from normal people. He recently named his youngest child "X Æ A-12". The pronunciation is something like "eks ash A twelve". The first letter is simply the letter "X" and the second one, which is a combination of "a" and "e", is actually a letter in several Scandinavian languages. In those languages, it is referred to as "ash". The "A-12" refers to the Lockheed A-12 "archangel", which is a military aircraft. Publicity stunt? Maybe. But there's no doubt that Elon Musk represents our age, in which tradition and stability are giving way to innovation and uncertainty. We are certainly living in interesting times.
